

- New restrictions have been introduced in Denmark.
- Restrictions that currently apply:
 - "Corona passport" at Zealand, restaurants, cafés, hairdressers, etc.
 - Night clubs are closed.
 - Bars, restaurants and cafes close at 10 PM.
 - Face masks: Zealand, restaurants, shops, supermarket and retail, public transportation, the airport, hospitals.
- Depending on which country you are travelling from, **travel restrictions** can have an impact on your arrival in Denmark.

Travel restrictions

Depending on which country you are travelling from, travel restrictions can have an impact on your arrival in Denmark.

Restrictions are **constantly changing** depending on infection rates and new COVID variants – we therefore advise you to stay alert:

 - COVID-19 test is required when entering Denmark exemptions might apply (previously infected e.g.).
 - Isolation requirements depending on country/region of departure (high-risk COVID countries)

Corona passport and testing

Corona passport

- Affective if you:
 - Have a negative COVID-19 test max 48 hours old (quick test) or max 72 hours (PCR)
 - Have had the first shot of the vaccine at least 14 days ago
 - Up to 5 months after being fully vaccinated*
 - Unlimted after third dose
 - Have a positive COVID-19 test which is at least 14 days old, but younger than 6 months
- Used for: Zealand campuses, Restaurants, bars, cafes, hairdressers, museums, zoos, etc.
- NOT used for: shops (including supermarkets and pharmacies), seeing a doctor.
- Is *expected* to still be required in February.

Testing

- It is very easy to get tested also if you do not have symptoms.
- The tests are free of charge for everyone.
- If you are registered in Denmark:
 - book a test or take quick test with your yellow health card.
- If you are not registered yet:
 - Register yourself at covidresult.dk and call to book a test.

*Fully vaccinated with a vaccine approved by EMA (European Medicines Agency):

- Pfizer BioNTech
- Moderna
- AstraZeneca
- Janssen Pharmaceutica



Vaccination programme in Denmark

- The vaccination is completely **voluntary** and **free of charge**.
- Only Pfizer BioNTech and Moderna are offered in Denmark unless you consult with a doctor first
- You can get vaccinated in Denmark if your stay is at least 30 days, even if you are not registered:
 - Capital Region of Denmark: +45 38660000
 - Region Zealand: +45 70204233

You will be automatically invited for vaccination when registered in Denmark (CPR No.)

4.6 million have been fully vaccinated (79% of the population)


More than 3 million got a third shot – offered after 4.5 months
