Everybody has to do a **Study Start Test** in February

Why?

• The purpose is to find out if you have actually started your studies and participated the first weeks

When?

- Monday the 7th of February between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.
- If you do not pass the first time, the 2nd and last attempt is Friday the 11th of February

What and how?

- You will receive a message in your student e-mail account with a link that leads directly to the test in Wiseflow (your student e-mail: ...@edu.easj.dk)
- Online Multiple Choice test with approximately 30 questions
- · All students, no matter which program or campus, will get the same test; i.e. no program-specific questions
- Focus is on the framework for your studies; rules and regulations, "service functions" at Zealand (where can you get help) etc.
- All types of aids are allowed and you are welcome to talk to your fellow students about the questions
